Patient Information on COVID Vaccine

What vaccines are available?

- There are 3 vaccines approved for use in UK which offer protection against COVID -19: Oxford/Astra Zeneca; Pfizer BioNtech; the Moderna vaccine
- None of the vaccines are live. Oxford AstraZeneca uses real virus that has been inactivated to cause immune response (similar to flu vaccine).
- They are considered safe in rheumatology patients even in those taking medications that suppress immune system.

Should I take the vaccine?

We encourage <u>all</u> patients to have the vaccine when it is offered. There are a few circumstances that you should <u>NOT</u> get a Pfizer or Moderna Vaccine:

- 1. If you have severe **unexplained** allergic reactions (e.g if you need to carry Epipen) or severe reactions to multiple drugs.
- 2. If you have previous allergy to certolizumab (Cimza)
- 3. If you had a reaction to the first Pfizer vaccine you should not have Moderna vaccine and vice versa.

In these cases you should take **Oxford/Astra Zeneca** vaccine instead.

When will I have the vaccine?

- The government and JCVI have set out priority groups for vaccination.
- We currently cannot influence or provide a date for your vaccine. This will come centrally or from your GP.

What should I do with my medications for my arthritis?

- You do not need to stop your medication (including steroid) for the vaccines.
- Stopping medication may risk a flare. This may in turn increase the risk of COVID-19.

What happens with shielding guidance after vaccination?

• You should continue to follow public health rules on shielding and social distancing even after the vaccine.

What are the common side effects of the vaccine?

- Local reactions/pain at the injection site (usually without redness or swelling)
- Fatigue, headache or mild fever may be experienced

Should I have the vaccine if I am pregnant, breastfeeding or waiting a surgery?
