


Urgent and emergency care at Russells Hall Hospital



Your Journey





Name and primary presenting condition taken

On arrival, one of our streaming nurses will ask for your name and reason for attending. The nurse will then decide where the best place is for you to be treated, either in the Urgent Care Centre or the Emergency Department.

Urgent Care Centre

Your journey to the Urgent Care Centre starts at the Emergency Department. You cannot access the UCC via any other route.

The Urgent Care Centre (UCC) offers non-emergency care for walk-in patients who have minor illnesses and injuries that need urgent attention and is staffed with GPs and nurse practitioners 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.

Some of the conditions treated here include:

- Minor burns and bites
- Fever and raised temperatures
- Sickness and vomiting
- Irritation and rashes
- Mild breathing difficulties
- Cuts and scrapes

Emergency Department

The Emergency Department (ED) cares for emergency patients who need immediate treatment for life threatening or very serious accidents and illnesses.


Some of the conditions treated here include:

- Loss of consciousness
- Confused state and fits
- Persistent and severe chest pain
- Severe breathing difficulties
- Heavy bleeding that cannot be stopped

ED can also care for patients with injuries the UCC cannot treat.

Some of these include:

- Sprains and fractures
- Chemical injuries
- Minor falls
- Wounds and cuts





By car - There is one main road entrance to the hospital site via the island where the A4101 Pensnett Road splits to become the A4101 Kingswinford Road.



By bus - The terminus is located outside the main entrance and there are also stops nearby in Pensnett Road and Kingswinford Road. Buses to Dudley, Kingswinford and Stourbridge run frequently throughout the day.



By rail - The nearest railway stations to Russells Hall Hospital are Cradley Heath, Dudley Port and Tipton.
