Two wards benefit from a generous grant from the Goodyear Workers Benevolent Fund

The Trust was delighted to receive a £37,000 grant to support two essential projects at Russell Hall Hospital from the Goodyear Workers Benevolent Fund.



Members of the Goodyear Workers Benevolent Fund met with staff on the Critical Care Unit to see for themselves the huge difference the Bioquell Pod will make

The first purchase was a £28,000 Bioquell Isolation Pod for the critical care unit. Karen Kelly, director of operations said: "The Pod is an amazing addition to the unit. It allows our staff to treat critically ill patients with confirmed or suspected infectious diseases, in a safe environment for the patient and their neighbours. When we do not have infectious patients it can be used as a normal bed space."

The therapy room in the Stroke Unit at Russells Hall Hospital also benefited from the grant. The unit was able to purchase 'RITA' which is a state of the art reminiscence interactive therapy unit. It was originally developed to aid therapy for dementia patients but it has also proved invaluable to support the recovery of Stroke patients.

Mr Barrett, Chairman of the 5/344 Transport and General Workers Union Branch Benevolent Fund said: "It's all about creating this living legacy for those who worked at Goodyear. We are proud to be able to purchase these items, and to know that patients will benefit for many years to come."

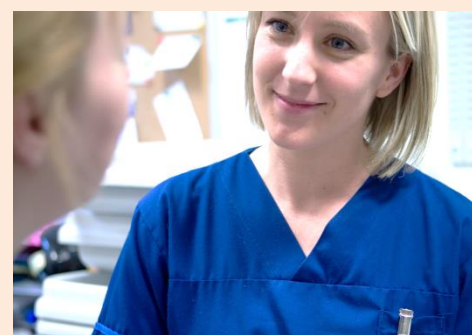

Will fortnight raises over £20,000

The 2018 Will Fortnight was the most successful campaign to date bringing in over £6,000 in donations. This brings the total from the past five years to over £20,000.

For two weeks, each October, Waldrons Solicitors write Wills for DGNHS Charity supporters free of charge. In exchange, the Will-makers are asked to make a donation to our charity. The campaign also highlights the need for everyone to have a Will.

"Most estimates are that around half of all adults in the UK don't have a Will which in turn could leave the law in control of their property and possessions. It may also mean that loved ones could be left with nothing." said Dawn Cash, an expert in Wills at Waldrons.

"The problem is that making a Will is a subject seldom spoken about

because it means talking about death. While no-one can control when the inevitable happens, everyone can maintain control of what happens to their possessions when it does. "We hope this move, as well as raising the importance of Wills, can support a charity that does so much good in the region." she said.

"Due to more complex family structures than in generations gone by and the rise of DIY Wills, a professionally drafted Will is more needed than ever. "Many cheap wills purchased via the internet could be defective, causing court battles and huge financial loss for many family members." Dawn concluded.
