Safe disposal of sharps

Paediatric Diabetes Team
Patient Information Leaflet

Introduction

This leaflet is about how to get rid of sharps safely. It is for people who have diabetes, or parents/carers of children who have diabetes.

How do I dispose of sharps?




Figure 1 shows a yellow sharps bin

Sharps include both needles and lancets. **You cannot put used sharps into general household waste bins.** You need to put them into a special yellow sharps bin (please see figure 1). These are available on prescription from your GP.

It is a good idea to have the sharps bin close when using needles and lancets so that you can put them straight in.

What happens when the sharps bin is full?

Once full, close the sharps bin securely and return it to your GP surgery. If you are living outside the Dudley area, please note that some GPs may have an alternative collection method for disposing of sharps bins. You will need to ask for this information from your GP surgery.

What if I injure myself with a used needle?

If you pierce or puncture your skin with a used needle, follow this first aid advice immediately:

- Encourage the wound to bleed, ideally by holding it under running water
- Wash the wound using running water and plenty of soap
- Do not scrub or suck the wound
- Dry the wound and cover it with a waterproof plaster or dressing
- You should also seek urgent medical advice at the nearest emergency department

What about when my child is at school?

You will need to take a sharps bin to your child's school. When this is full, you will need to collect it and dispose of it in the usual way.

Advice for your child when they are at school

Ask your child to put their own needle safely in sharps bin when they use it. They should make sure they are near the bin before they use the sharp.

If your child is very young or disabled, and a member of staff is therefore doing the injections, the staff member must always:

- Use AutoShield needles (see figure 2)
- Never put needles back in the sheath (cover)
- Wear gloves for personal protection as stated in the school policy
