Trust is in the running for prestigious awards

The Dudley Group has been revealed as a finalist for their ground-breaking paediatric virtual ward program.

The Dudley Group Foundation Trust is thrilled to announce that they have been selected as finalists for a prestigious Royal College of Nursing (RCN) award and Nursing Times Award for their innovative Paediatric Virtual Ward that allows children to be safely cared for in their own home and avoids them staying in hospital longer than they

The first of its kind in the UK, the Paediatric Virtual Ward aims to further provide outstanding care to young patients. Patients who would otherwise be treated in hospital, are able to be treated in their homes, enabling earlier supported discharge and reduce admissions, all whilst maintaining specialist care.

Trailblazing

The trailblazing program, which to date is completely unique, has been driven by the children's services team at Russells Hall Hospital with the support of Black Country and West Birmingham CCG (BCWB CCG).

Patients who are identified as needing to be monitored whilst not requiring acute care are able to return home, where their family or carers can comfortably monitor and share their vitals through NHS issued tablets that provide consistent contact with the Virtual Ward team. Regular telephone contact is also maintained, and community care where suitable.

Anum Shazady, who uses the virtual ward for her son, said: "Now my son is on the virtual ward I can record his observations as many times as I want throughout the day, recording them onto the virtual ward pad and a member of staff calls me twice daily which reassures me that he is safe in our home environment."

Since its launch, the virtual ward has reduced the length of hospital stay by an average of three days per child. Parents and carers now feel fully supported when caring for a sick child at home. This has reduced the need for GP appointments and the use of emergency services.

The Trust's head of children's services Karen Anderson said: "We are thrilled that our virtual ward

program has been recognised by the Royal College of Nursing and that the phenomenal work of our paediatrics team is being highlighted."

There has been considerable interest in the virtual ward model, and it is being adopted by paediatric services within BCWB CCG: Sandwell and Walsall and Wolverhampton.

Chief Executive for The Dudley Group Diane Wake said: "The virtual ward is just one way the team are supporting children and their families, and it also demonstrates this Trust's dedication and commitment to service innovation and building a workforce for the future.

■ Our Communications Team has been shortlisted for a Health Service Iournal NHS Communications Initiative of the Year award.

They are nominated for their "Engaging staff for a better future: NHS Staff Survey" project which among other things allowed volunteers to queue for members of staff while they completed their feedback forms.

The collaborative project enabled the Trust staff survey return rates to go from 46% to our highest ever figure of 59% which is fundamental in ensuring we can make Dudley the very best place to work and thrive.

This incredible 13% rise was one of the largest increases across all 217 NHS trusts involved in the survey and compares to an overall average increase of 2% in response rates.

The HSJ Awards will take place on the 17th November.

During the day he also learnt more about the Integrated Care Team (ICT) hosted by Lion Health and met one of the GPs who leads the (ICT), Dr Simon Carvell.

Lion Health is the largest GP practice in Dudley and has a very effective ICT which brings multi-disciplinary professionals together to discuss vulnerable patients.

The afternoon started with presentations on the NHS systems and processes focusing in particular on governance and human factors in preventing



Work to cut carbon footprint recognised

The Dudley Group is celebrating after one of its employees won an outstanding contribution award at the NHS Midlands Excellence in Supply Awards.

Clare Nash, head of clinical products management for the Black Country Alliance at The Dudley Group, was recognised for her Outstanding Contribution to Procurement at the awards night, which was attended by professionals from NHS Trusts across the North, West and East Midlands and the East of England.

Clare's role now involves ensuring the products used by the Trusts not only provide the best possible care for patients and value for money, but also fit in with the Trusts' plans to reduce their carbon foot-

These include moving the Dudley Group Foundation Trust to using sustainable recycled paper which has saved around 41,000 trees from the chop, rejecting a switch of syringes from a European-based manufacturer to one made in the Far East, which has prevented an additional 1.3 tons of CO2 emissions from the additional transport miles and also investing in reusable PPE including gowns and

half face masks as greener alterna-

On winning her award, Clare said: "I am so proud of this win and to be recognised for the hard work I have put in to grow the Greener Procurement agenda across the Black Country Alliance.

The award recognises the work our clinical teams and I have put in which is very exciting, as well as the support the wider Trust gives to the Greener NHS.

"I am not resting on my laurels though, as there is a lot to do, but we have the support of The Dudley Group Foundation Trust Board to take this further, and to engage and educate staff on what they can contribute to getting us to net zero."

Commenting on Clare's success, Diane Wake, chief executive for The Dudley Group, said: "Climate change is a health emergency, and the NHS has a target to have a net zero carbon footprint by 2045.

To have someone as passionate Clare working within our trust to help us achieve this goal is something we are very grateful for, and we are immensely proud of her winning this award.

Breast cancer videos bid to help ease anxiety

Two videos have been launched to help deaf and hard of hearing women recognise signs and symptoms of breast cancer.

How to be Breast Aware and

A Guide to the Breast Screening Appointment feature interpreters using sign language to get across vital, potentially life-saving information on how to be breast aware, and to help deaf and hard of hearing women understand what to expect during a mammogram.

The videos have been produced, with the help of the deaf community, by The Dudley Group NHS Foundation Trust which runs the Dudley, Wolverhampton and South West Staffordshire Breast Screening Service, and the digital media team at the Ron Grimley Undergraduate Centre at Russells Hall

They were commissioned by the charity Zebra Access to ease fears and anxieties during breast screening appointments because women in the deaf community often feel isolated and frustrated when accessing healthcare. This

has been particularly difficult during COVID.

Robina Ajimal, who was born deaf to hearing parents, has worked for an interpreting agency for nine years and appears on 'How to be Breast Aware'

"Deaf people like to see information visually to get an explanation of what's going to happen.'

Linda Beasley works for Zebra Access, a charity dedicated to ensuring that all deaf people enjoy equal participation and access without communication barriers

"A Guide to breast screening is a very clear, step-by-step guide of what to expect during a mammogram which gives much needed confidence to deaf, hard of hearing and deaf/blind people," said Linda, who has also been deaf from birth.

Chief executive for The Dudley Group Diane Wake said one in seven women will be diagnosed with breast cancer in their lifetime and this causes 10,000 deaths annually in the UK. She stressed the importance of attending mammogram appointments when invited.

Chairman bids farewell after three years in role

A recent independent external review of how 'well led' we are across the Trust at all levels from 'Board to Ward' commented on the transformation in our leadership and governance.

Also, we as a Trust are acknowledged to be playing a key role in sup-

Vascular hub hailed as best performing across country

The Black Country Vascular Hub, based at Russells Hall Hospital, has been identified as Number One in the country for ensuring patients with abdominal aortic aneurysm (AAA) get potential life-saving surgery in

a timely manner.

Thanks to the incredible hard work of members of the Black Country Vascular Network, we have been ranked as the best performing out of 38 other AAA screening programmes for meeting standard pathway time to surgery following initial identification.

Dudley Group CEO Diane Wake said: "I am so very proud of the Dudley team and this is a result of everyone pulling together to put our patients first. The Black Country Vascular Network operates as a hub for the whole Black Country population and delivers highly-skilled, emergency and elective vascular surgery.
"The Black Country AAA

Screening Programme has been run by The Dudley Group since 2012 and the staff do a truly incredible job."

Consultant and AAA screening programme director Mr Rajiv Pathak said: "Our whole team has done a great job in tackling the backlog because of COVID. We are also working towards achieving full restoration of the AAA screening programme across the Black Country."

Screening

Screening programme manager Karina Lloyd said: "AAA is a disease that primarily affects the older male population and when men reach 65 they are invited for the screening ultrasound.
"You normally do not know

you have an AAA; if undetected and left untreated this can cause early death and rupture and it is why screening in men is so important."

Rebecca Farmer, NHS England Director for Delivery and Improvement in the Midlands, added: "We know that NHS colleagues across the country have been facing a real chal-lenge in safely delivering as much elective surgery as possible as we continue to manage the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic.

"It's a great credit to the hard work of the team at the Black Country Vascular Hub to be identified as the best performing vascular surgery programme in the country, which is benefitting local patients in getting the care they need

This summer, health and care services have changed across the Black Country to meet local

Each part of the country now has what is known as an Integrated Care System (ICS) – partnerships of organisations that come together to plan and deliver joined up health and care services to improve the lives of people in their area.

The Dudley Group Foundation Trust is now part of the Black Country ICS, known as Healthier Futures. Our ICS brings local providers and commissioners

of NHS services together with local authorities and other partners, who work collaboratively to provide care to our communities.

The Black Country ICS will be made up of two key

bodies – an NHS Integrated Care Board (ICB) and an Integrated Care Partnership (ICP). ICBs will take on functions from the current NHS Clinical Commissioning Groups (CCGs), which have now been dissolved, and have greater strategic responsibility for setting healthcare strategies for their local system.

The new Black Country ICB, which has been formally established, will take on the existing responsibilities of the NHS Black Country and West Birmingham CCG, and will be responsible for planning and coordinating services on behalf of 1.26 million local people, as well as managing the local NHS budget.

The ICB, which covers Dudley, Sandwell, Walsall and Wolverhampton, will also bring the local health and care system together, with its board of officials comprising those from within the organisation as well as representatives from local NHS trusts, primary care, local authorities, voluntary organisations and community providers.
