Paragraph/s relating to The Dudley Group	Hospital bosses in Dudley are to introduce a 'zero tolerance' rule over ambulance handovers to A&E keeping patients waiting more than 30 minutes. Dudley Group NHS Foundation Trust said it will introduce a zero tolerance policy and will be working with West Midlands Ambulance Trust to address the issue.
Press enquiry	The Express and Star contacted the Trust having picked up mention of the zero tolerance policy in the board papers available on the Trust website. They asked: How will the zero tolerance policy be enforced and monitored? Will there be a penalty for going over this at all? Hospital bosses have said the ambulance handover target has been a challenge, will this enforcement help tackle this directly?
