First paragraph/s of article	Cash-strapped hospital trusts in the Black Country and Staffordshire are spending hundreds of thousands of pounds on translators to cater for patients who do not speak English.
Paragraph/s relating to The Dudley Group	Mid Staffordshire NHS Foundation Trust, which has a multi-million pound deficit, spent £26,472 while £15,000 was spent at Russells Hall Hospital, Dudley. The Dudley Group of Hospitals plans to save £9.7m of its total income budget in 2012/13.
