

Urinary free cortisol test

Diabetes and Endocrinology Patient Information Leaflet

Introduction

This leaflet is for people who have been recommended to have a urinary free cortisol test. It gives information about what the test is for and how it is carried out.

What is a urinary free cortisol test?

It is a test to measure the amount of free cortisol in your urine over a 24 hour period. It is used to screen for Cushing's syndrome, a condition in which too much of the hormone cortisol is produced by the adrenal glands. You will collect the urine at home.

Occasionally other conditions, such as major depression, alcoholism, stress, obesity, kidney failure, pregnancy or uncontrolled diabetes, can cause increased urinary cortisol levels.

What should I do before the test?

Please let us know if you are currently taking any medication (prescription or non-prescription) containing **steroids**, or you have taken them in the past, as we will need to give you special instructions about this.

You should continue to take all your other prescribed medication and treatments as usual, unless you are instructed to do otherwise.

How do I collect a 24 hour urine specimen?

The accuracy of the test is dependent upon how well you are able to collect the specimen so please make sure you follow these instructions:

- Collect a specimen container before leaving the department. If the container contains preservative, do not get rid of this – please leave it in there. Keep the container out of reach of children.
- Drink your normal fluid intake during the day before and the day of collection. Do not drink more than normal.
- The 24 hour period begins when you get up in the morning and empty your bladder. Do not collect this urine but do write down the time and date you urinated on the specimen container label.
- For the next 24 hours, collect all your urine day and night –
 until the final collection. This is when you empty your bladder the
 next morning, about 24 hours from the time of your first urine
 marked on your specimen container. Include this last sample in
 the collection jug along with all the other samples.
- Keep the specimen container in a cool place refrigerate it if possible.
- Ensure that you label the container correctly (including the time) otherwise it will be not be able to be analysed.
- Return the specimen to Russells Hall Hospital, Pathology
 Department as soon as possible after the last collection. Please
 ask a member of pathology reception staff to check the sample
 is correctly labelled.

How will I find out the results of the test?

Usually, the results are available about two to three weeks after you have given us the specimen. You will receive a letter informing you of the results and if any further tests need to be performed. If the results are abnormal, we will send you an appointment for a member of the endocrine department to discuss further tests and treatment with you.
